Course Title: Special Topics in Applied Animal Welfare Science – Poultry Welfare

Course Content

Specific Learning Outcomes:

This course should give students a thorough understanding of domestic bird welfare. The general aims of the course are to:

- 1. introduce students to domestic bird welfare
- 2. identify bird welfare issues associated with farming and why they are important
- 3. identify how to use relevant information technology to access and analyse literature
- 4. introduce students how to evaluate relevant research and identify research knowledge gaps
- 5. introduce students how to incorporate outside (field trips) experiences to break down the barriers between the university and real-world on-farm bird welfare problems

Course Delivery and Evaluation:

The course will be delivered throughout 5 days at the University of Guelph. During this period, contact time will include lectures, discussions, and a field visit/field visits (depending on availability). Discussions will be done in small groups via Gallery Walks in oral and written presentations completed during the course week.

At the end of this intensive class period, students will write a literature review on a specific topic related to domestic bird welfare. This review will be due, and presented to the class, ten weeks later (time and location: TBD). Students will be evaluated on contribution to the discussion in (Gallery Walks) and outside (field trip) class (50%), a literature review (on a specific topic related to domestic bird 30%) and presentation of that literature review to the class (20%).
